## Outdoor Projects Added by 4-H

Four-H day camps, sponsored through the Cooperative Extension Expanded Nutrition Program, is offering new outdoor experiences and 4-H short-term projects for Central Hillside youngsters and those living in the Irving Park area of Duluth.

The first camp, recently held at Layfayette Square on Park Point, had an enrollment of 60 campers.

Activities included campfire cook-outs, swimming, crafts, sand sculpture, cookie baking, nature hikes and games.

Socialization, a major camp objective, was accomplished through family style meals, partly prepared by the campers. An overnight camp-out at Island Lake was offered during the camp session for older campers. Field trips to local points of interest were planned by the campers with their counselors.

The Model City Administration provided bus transportation for the camp at Park Point and several local businesses have been cooperative in supporting the program.

Two other day camps are being offered by 4-H, at Irving Park and at Floodwood. The Irving Park camp began July 6 and will continue to July 17, while the Floodwood day camp will run from July 21-24.

Barbara Meldahl and Lynn Haagenson, co-directors, hope the camp will further stimulate the children's interest and prove that learning can be fun.

## State Revises Shorelands Standards

Revised standards for management of Minnesota shorelands have been adopted as a result of recent public meetings and a hearing conducted by the Conservation Department.

Jarle Leirfallom, state conservation commissioner, said the changes are to make standards easier to implement and more flexible to meet the needs of special problems.

The changes include a provision for administering a program left to local discretion, making agricultural waste disposal operations subject to Pollution Control Agency regulations, greater flexibility for tree cutting provisions, and the reduction of lot size requirements on natural environmental lakes and streams.

Lake classification, a major part of the standards, is progressing and should be completed by September, according to Leirfallom.

Counties have until July 1, 1972, to enact ordinances conforming with state regulations.

TAMPA, Fla. (AP)—A federal judge has barred the city of Clearwater from levying a special tax on theaters showing X- and R-rated movies.


