


Obituary



WILLIAM H. LANDWEHR

Dying from a heart ailment suddenly at 11 a. m., Thursday was William H. Landwehr, early St. Cloud business man, who established the Landwehr Transfer Line. Mr. Landwehr expected to have his 70th birthday next Monday. He was up town Thursday morning when he suddenly felt ill, was taken home and died a few hours later. His residence is located at 217 Seventh avenue south.

The body will be at home until Monday when funeral services will be read by Rt. Rev. Msgr. Edward Mahowald at 9 a. m., in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception. Mr. Landwehr was a member of the Holy Name society and the Rosary confraternity.

August 1, 1868, marked the date of his birth in St. Augusta, the son of Henry Landwehr and the former Gertrude Kiffmeyer. Five brothers and one sister are dead. One brother, Frank Landwehr, of Sedan, survives.

Mr. Landwehr was educated and grew to manhood in his native town where he married Josephine Weyrauch of St. Cloud township on January 13, 1891. They lived on a farm in this township for three years when they moved to Benton county to his brother's farm where he finished his five year career as a farmer.

When the Landwehrs moved to St. Cloud in 1896, Mr. Landwehr was associated with E. Everett Clark in the lumber business for two years. In 1898 he began the Landwehr Transfer business, establishing his office on Seventh avenue north across from the old fire house. He was at this location until 1915 when he transferred to the corner of Sixth avenue north that is now the site of the Fritz-Cross company. Three years more of business followed at that address when his son, H. W. Landwehr, took over the business, moving to its present location at 202 Sixth avenue north. The next five years Mr. Landwehr was engaged in selling gas and oil after which he began the house moving trade. He was actively engaged in this work at his home address until his retirement two years ago.

Mr. Landwehr's mother, the famous Mrs. Gertrude Landwehr, lived to be 104 years of age and died in 1933 here at St. Joseph's home, one of the best known personages to span the years of central Minnesota's pioneer history.

Surviving are Mrs. Landwehr with seven children: Edward of Motley; Herbert, Mrs. Frank Fallow, Alfred, Clarence, Otto and Emma Landwehr, all of St. Cloud. There are 22 grandchildren.
